

EUROCAMP 2010—Hundsdorf / Germany



"One of the best camps I've ever been to" – a sentence that could be heard among the leaders of the Baden-Powell Scouts – and I feel, many of the 1,300 participants would agree.

It all started some years ago – memories of a great Eurocamp 2006 in Switzerland were strong– and the General Assembly decided in favour of Hunsdorf in Germany, a team of volunteers, mainly from Asgard, ISA and BCP Scouts was ready to take over the responsibility for the organisation.

Soon thereafter I received a circular from the organising team "Help needed – who could assist us in the organisation?" Well.... (a good deed every day is a must for every scout).... so I forwarded the message to all our Rovers and Senior Scouts in the Solmser Pfadfinderschaft...

(If I only had known beforehand, what this would end-up with.....).

Immediately, I got the reply from Nadine – one of our group leaders: "I'd like to help, but my English is not sufficient and my only experience in organising camps is in a range of less than 100 participants in a three-daycamp near our hometown......" I encouraged her to take the challenge, as this seemed to me a unique chance for her to gain valuable experiences and furthermore to enhance the network among WFIS associations.

So – I informed Kiebitz about this background...... and Nadine was welcomed to the organising team (as an assistant, at least I hoped so) with open arms. Well – then it started: Nadine came back from the first meeting in Hamburg, smiled at me and said: "We have to organise many days in both Scout and Rover programmes......" She didn't have a clue how to run the show, nor did I!!! So my first reaction was to send a "nice" message to the organising team, giving them a lesson about the slight difference between "helping to organise" and "being responsible for a big part of the organisation"....

Next was a cry for help within our own association – and thank goodness, we found six Rovers ready to take a part. Their English was ok, but their experience in an organisation of camps with more than 100 scouts and wolf cubs was zero. Those who so far had only organised hikes for a limited number of small groups all at a sudden found themselves in the middle of the challenge to arrange a hike for 20 groups with up to 40 scouts each!

Others, used to organising wildgames in local forests for about 50 scouts, faced the challenge to organise a whole- day- game for 800! The only one with experience in large-camporganisation was (after almost 50 years in scouting) poor Funko – so I found myself involved in the show as well.



The months and weeks before the camp became more and more busy –, the flags needed organising, trips to Hunsdorf to see the area and the ways through the forests, negotiating with farmers and foresters, some days with 4 hours of meetings, copying papers, buying materials etc – sometimes the organising Rovers had to take a day of vacation for their preparations.

Contacts to Popper and Kiebitz indicated, that it was even tougher on their side, as so many things had to be organised: which hospitals to go to in case of accidents/ sicknesses (and I found the hospital in Dernbach quite frequented by uniformed



patients...), toilets, catering services, coordination of the program- activities, busses to be hired for the tourist-days, wood poles (mostly cut by Klaus and his family) in big numbers, firewood etc, etc.

I personally was busy with the visit of our partners from Russia – from fundraising over visa- support to finding of hostfamilies for the visit after the Eurocamp, organisation of several day cultural, historical and political programs (not to forget the fun, everyone liked to have). And on top of that – our *(Continued on page 3)* friend Claudio (a 9-year old wolf cub) came alone from Mexico and was hosted by our scouts for 6 weeks. So, with 60 scouts and wolf-cubs, including the young Mexican and our Russian friends, we set-off to Hundsdorf. At the campsite, it was for many of us like "coming home": all over the place one could meet friends from different countries – a shake-hand here, small talk there – hardly time for more.



For setting up our camp, we brought not only all of our tents, but had as well brought three tents from Carlos, as many Italian scouts could not bring their tents so we could help-out. Also, our Russian partners needed tents – so they all learned how to build-up a German "Jurte" and "Kohte".

The days in the Eurocamp passed too fast – from a memorable opening ceremony – with Klaus greeting each nation and WFIS scouts coming from five global regions and 14 countries – to the closing campfire.

Our wolf cubs and beavers were busy with producing ink and stuff from materials found in nature, visiting castles and zoos and having lots of lot of fun. Rovers built towers, sliding-ropes, gates and a big stone-throwing-machine (which was used so intensively that it broke the same day.....), and went on a hike, while the scouts proved their skills on their own hike through the near-by forests. The highlight for them was the medieval-game-day, when about 800 of them - dressed in typical costumes - went through the forests, digging for gold, fighting to conquer the gold of the other teams and trying to increase their gold in tournament games. In the evening, the gold acquired throughout the day was weighed. and the (Belgian) herold announced the Earl of the winning team to be the new Emperor.

The tourist day saw our Russian friends visiting Phantasialand, others went to the river Rhine or explored a famous cave near-by. For all – this was another exciting day. Campfires in the sub-camps (we were glad to be shown by our Czech friends how they light a camp-fire – a really unique way), on the central place and in the areas of individual associations helped to tighten the already existing partnerships and to buildup new links among WFIS groups in Europe and to overseas.

At the International Day, our Russian friends offered traditional Russian food, which they prepared in their national costumes, so many visitors came to our camp. But all over the camp you could see interesting shows, things to do or to be learned and – of course – badges swappers all over the place.....



The Eurocamp 2010 was a good indication for the fast growth of WFIS – only 14-years old – in an environment, where all other globally operating organisations are losing members in big numbers each year.

Thanks to Kiebitz, Popper, Nadine, Klaus & co for the organisation, thanks to Karim, Mounty, Puck, Forsti, Feder and Jecky for organising part of the program, thanks to Judith for the wolf-cub events and thanks to the many involved in running the show.

To end with another sentence frequently heard upon departure: "See you next year in Mexico" or

"See you next Eurocamp in 2014"!



Czech looking back at Eurocamp

At the beginning of August this year, the 15-member group composed of leaders, Rovers and Scouts attended the International Camp in Germany.



Most of us had no experience of participation in such an undertaking. Although we had information about

the programme, each one was filled with expectation and some fear of a possible language

barrier. Just the size of event surprised us - 1,200 participants new friends across the nations, from 12 countries in one place. How to organize a mass of people, and provide the necessary facilities (places for tents, toilets, showers, dining room and kitchen)?

Throughout the week we had the opportunity to compare the action of Czech Scouting with each other - English, Canadian, German, Russian, Belgian, DanishPlease sorry to anyone, I forgot. A very informative and interesting finding was that not every country can, through laws and other conditions, operate in scouting activities such as in Czech Republic. During Subcamp fire we showed one of Czech ceremonial fire ignition. We could also try new things, meet new and old friends from Woodbeads.

On the day of departure of our group, I asked for feedback from all participants. And what was the outcome? Everyone enjoyed it and did not regret their full

participation, created a lot of which broke down the language barriers. Definitely recommended for everyone, with no fear. For the next time we have to be better prepared for the SWAP DAY.

The behaviour of some Associations was different from my experience of Scouting and I found it a challenge to fit in with some of the ways that things are done, but it was interesting to see how Associations behave

Nations and their temperaments are different but Scouting is only one.




